## Subcommittee Background

- Created by Governor Little as part of the Idaho Criminal Justice Commission
- Formed in response to OPE reports on Idaho's coroner system
- Builds on Senate Bill 1101 (2025) which established basic coroner duties and responsibilities
- Goal is to develop policy recommendations by October/November for the governor's consideration

#### Key Discussion: Current Coroner System Assessment

Attendees described the current system as:

- Will Carson (Twin Falls Coroner): "It makes a difference in what county you die," noting inconsistent services across counties
- Sheriff Quayle (Fremont County): Emphasized the tension between constitutional office tradition and funding realities
- Bernie LaSarte (Coeur d'Alene Tribe): Noted inconsistencies in standards, resources, and funding
- Matthew Gamette (ISP Forensic): Described the system as "ignored" and "underresourced" but having the right structure for Idaho
- **Torey Danner (Bannock County Coroner)**: Called the system "broken and inconsistent" with only 6 full-time coroners statewide
- **Ryan Langrill (OPE)**: Noted the system is "fractured and inconsistent" with "high level of risk, chain of custody issues"

# Issues Identified for Future Consideration ("Grocery List" Items)

- 1. Records confidentiality and privacy policies (suggested by Senator Wintrow)
  - Need for standardized protocols for storing information
  - Balancing privacy concerns with public transparency
  - Prompted by a constituent case involving inappropriate disclosure of photos
- 2. Access to autopsy services (suggested by Matthew Gamette)
  - Limited regional availability (currently only in Ada County and Spokane, WA)
  - Need for regional facilities across the state, especially in northern Idaho
  - Exploration of ISP forensic services conducting autopsies (suggested by Torey Danner)
- 3. Standardized reporting and systems (suggested by Matthew Gamette)
  - Need for uniform death investigation and reporting standards
  - Improved data systems, sharing, and accessibility
  - Need for computer/technology access for all coroners
- 4. Autopsy capacity and requirements (suggested by Torey Danner)
  - Concern about mandating autopsies without adequate resources
  - Need to evaluate current capacity before expanding requirements
  - Need for regional solutions to spread workload
- 5. Eligibility and professional standards (suggested by Sheriff Quayle)
  - Establishing minimum professional standards
  - Need for training on search and seizure laws and constitutional requirements
  - Challenge of providing funding for required training
- 6. **Funding for autopsies** (raised by Sheriff Quayle)
  - Counties with small budgets struggle to pay for necessary autopsies
  - External pressure from agencies like NTSB requiring autopsies in certain cases
  - Need for sustainable funding mechanism
- 7. State-level organizational home (suggested by Ryan Langrill)
  - Need for state-level entity to house resources and oversight
  - Identified as necessary foundation for other improvements
- 8. First responder status (suggested by Ryan Langrill)
  - Consideration of designating coroners as first responders
  - Access to mental health resources and workers' compensation for PTSD

- 1. Senator Wintrow to distribute:
  - JLOC study
  - Link to SB 1101 legislation
  - County-by-county resource study
  - Meeting notes and specific preparation prompt for next meeting
- 2. All members to:
  - Review distributed materials
  - Prepare to discuss "what the coroner system would look like if it was successful 50 years from now"
- 3. Kelli Brassfield to:

- Continue working to add prosecutor representation to the subcommittee (Matthew Gamette suggested a prosecutor from Blaine County)
- Add county commissioner representation
- Develop agenda for next meeting
- 4. Torey Danner to:
  - Prepare to answer questions about current system and SB 1101 implementation rather than giving a formal presentation
